EMERGING LEADERS' SUMMIT

100 Years. One Future. Blazing the Trail Ahead.

From October 10–12 ATC brought together young changemakers from across the country for three transformative days of connection, learning, and leadership development at the Emerging Leaders Summit.

This year's summit empowered participants ages 18–30 to explore the intersection of conservation, community, and leadership. Through immersive workshops, outdoor experiences along the Appalachian Trail, and shared storytelling, participants built lasting connections and developed the skills to become stewards of the Trail and advocates for inclusive, outdoor spaces.



Nestled in the heart of the New Jersey Highlands, just a couple miles from the Appalachian Trail, the New Jersey School of Conservation (NJSOC) provided the perfect natural classroom for the 2025 Emerging Leaders Summit. Surrounded by forested ridges and abundant wildlife, this historic environmental education campus offered an inspiring setting for reflection, collaboration, and connection to place.






Participant Ethnicity Representation


Participant Gender Representation
